CHAPLAIN STANLEY BRACH

LT. PAUL N. CARNES

Father Stanley C. Brach, Chaplain of Oflag 64, is one of the oldest American prisoners on record. He was captured at Mateur, Tunisia on Thanksgiving Day, 1942.

He worked as a parish priest in both Jersey City and Hoboken, where he also acted as spiritual advisor at Steven's Institute of Technology.

Along with daily mass and services, Father Brach spends most of his time helping kriegies over the bumps. His room is rarely without someone seeking advice, help with hobbies (at which he is something of a specialist) or just a good old-fashioned bull-session.

Since Easter Sunday, Lt. Paul N. Carnes of Ellettsville, Ind. has conducted the general Protestant service each Sunday.

Lt. Carnes, whose father is a Methodist minister, received his degree at Indiana University where he won his Phi Beta Kappa key. He was preparing for the seminary at Boston U. when he was commissioned in the Army in May of '42.

He was wounded and captured at Medjez el Bab on Christmas Day of 1942 and arrived here last October by way of Chieti.

Paul's idea, as developed by his weekly sermons, is to make each man his own theologian — with a personal religion, compatible with modern progress.

The new basketball schedule opens the second week in August with new combinations battling for honors in the third round of the season.

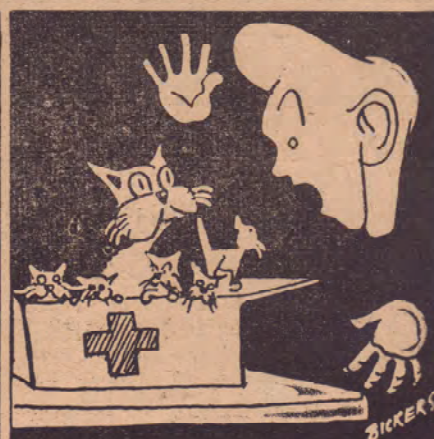
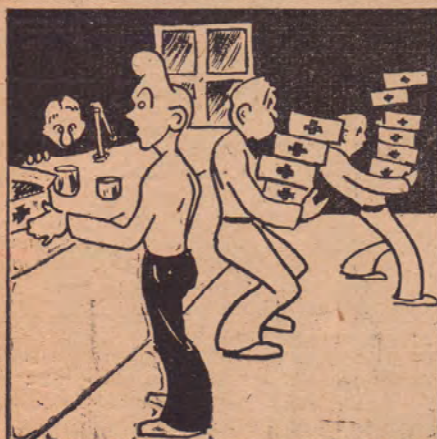
Twelve strong volleyball teams open the new league today under the direction of Ed Spicher. This is the second schedule in the season's play.

If he longs for a shot of Grandpap's "Four Roscs", he will drop two grams of powdered rye into a prepared solution and — HIC — there he ish.

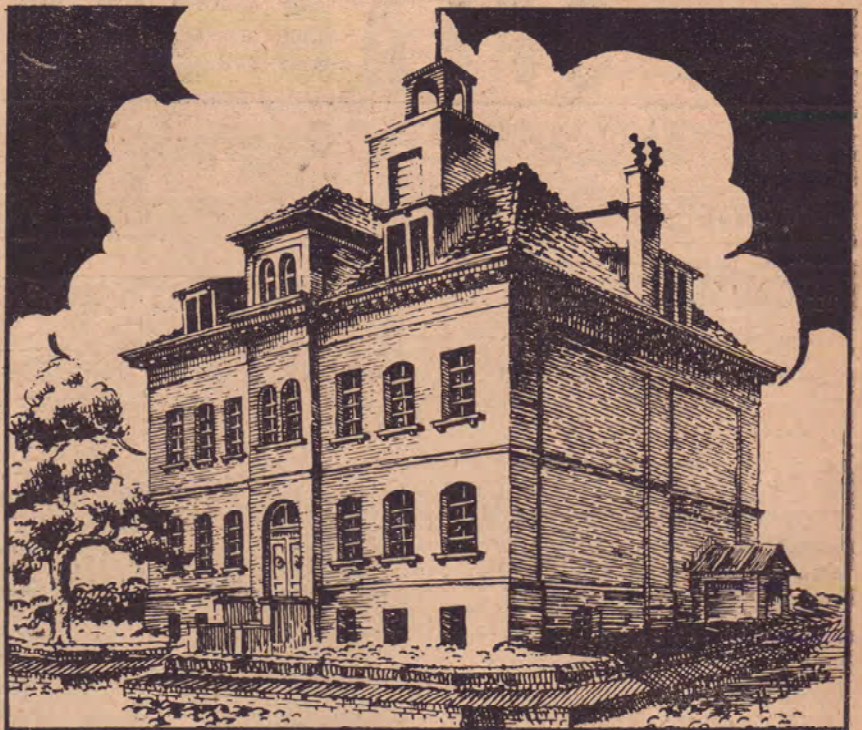

They don't mind their work, but they say the shoe really pinches when they hear the daily song hit — "You're It For Tomorrow," by their Top Kick, First Sergeant Carn A. Godsey.
