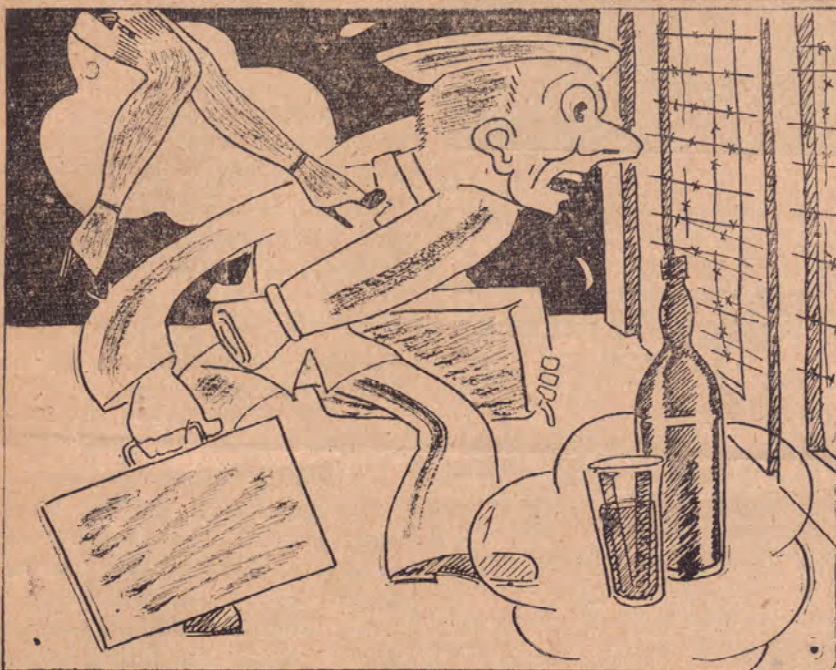

Tricky Trade Tycoon Clears 1000 Points

Kriegies Leave Something For Posterity, It Says Here

Offalagburg, Germany, October 30, 1993. Semi-wild tribes did exist in Offalagburg, Germany, according to scientific authorities who have recently begun to excavate the ruins of this ancient city.

In a report to the Geological Institute of America, Professor N. C. Mentus stated that great quantities of paper boxes bearing the red "crusader" emblem, and many different types of metal tubing thought to have contained foodstuffs were recently unearthed from a prehistoric brick building.

One of the metal tubes bore the print of a maid on it. A reddishbrown substance scraped from the inside, thought at first to be a form of potassium permanganate, showed a small caffeine content.

He was graduated from the Point in '29, got married and began his military life in the infantry.

This was changed in July, '41, when the pipe-smoking, sports-loving Missourian joined a newly-organized paratroop outfit.

Then for two years, says the Colonel, he fought the Battle of Phocnix City.

He came overseas last December and led his paratroop regiment into Normandy on "D" Day. Three days later he was transferred in grade to Kriegy Command A.

Col. Millett has one comment on life behind barbed wire: "Captivity certainly makes a man pessimistic."

But it hasn't hit the Colonel yet—he thinks the war will end by November.

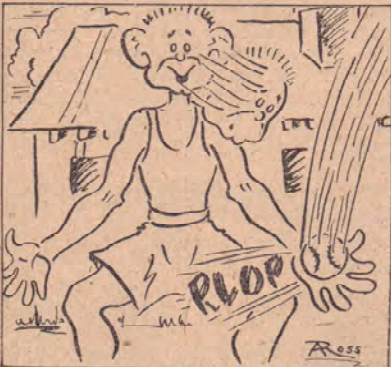

But that's all changed now.

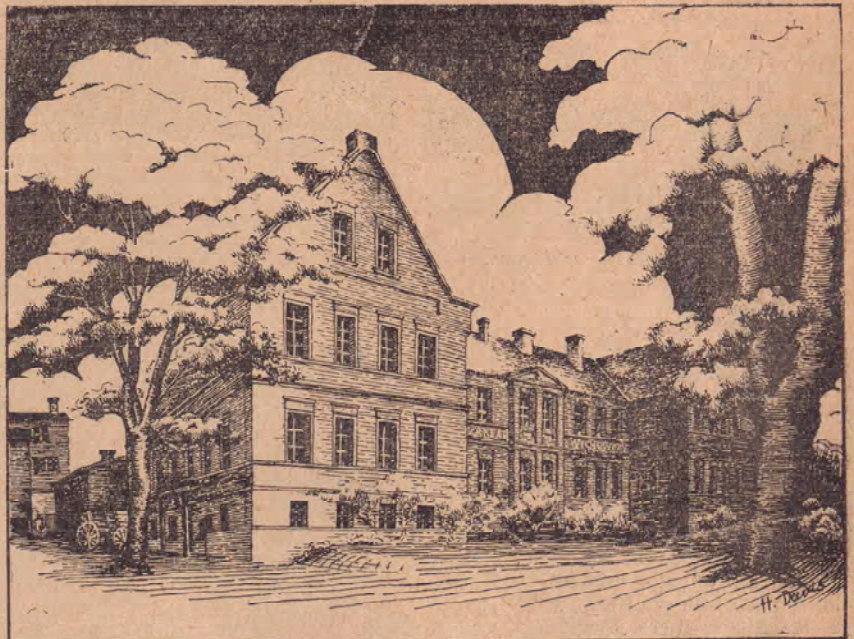
